

THE INFLUENCE OF CONFLICTS IN RADHAR PANCA DAHANA'S NOVEL *GANJAR DAN GUA SI LEUNGLI*

Abstract

The first objective is to show the depiction of the main characters; *Ganjar dan Gua si Leungli* character development. The second objective is to show the conflicts that are faced by *Ganjar dan Gua si Leungli* from the novel. Three theories of theory of character and characterization, theory of conflict, and theory of character development is included in order to conduct this study better. Since this study is a library research, the printed materials and internet sources are compiled. The main approach that the writer uses in this study is the formalist approach. The way they response those conflicts shows they develop their characteristic for the better of the worse (Hurlock: 1974). Thus, the conflicts influence their character development.
