The substance is seen from the discourse that leads to the meaning and consequences of the novel 'A Perfect Life' by Danielle Steel. The aim of this research is first to understand speech acts and types of speech acts. Second, as information about directive, commissive and expressive speech acts, namely the types of speech acts used by speakers to direct listeners to carry out certain actions. The results of this research found directive speech acts, namely: orders, commands, requests, suggestions, inviting then commissive namely promising, threatening, refusing, offering and expressive speech acts, namely: requesting, pain, likes, dislikes, joy and sorrow. The speech acts that are mainly produced by the dominant main character are directives; requesting & questioning and expressive dislike feelings of pain.
